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School Overview

Our high-quality teachers concentrate on the development of a strong growth mindset and foster a strong 'can do attitude'. Our belief is that all students can learn and achieve at the highest level regardless of their background.

Clarkson Primary School is an Independent Public School catering for students from Kindergarten to Year 6 in the suburb of Clarkson and surrounding areas.

Our school provides evidence based learning programs, promotes community participation and develops a supportive and nurturing school environment for students, parents and staff.

Clarkson Primary School celebrates a rich cultural diversity with a high proportion of our students from language backgrounds other than English. Approximately 18% of our students are Indigenous and many students are from countries such as the UK, New Zealand and Asia.

Our school is supported by a Chaplain, Aboriginal and Islander Education Officer and School Psychologist. A fully established Early Start Program for three-year-old's and their parents helps ensure they are ready for the start of school and is now available for those enrolling in Kindergarten from around the start of Term 3. Support a Reader, Positive Behaviours, Fitness Club, and lunch time programs all combine to create a safe and friendly environment that is designed to engage all students in their learning.

Our specialist areas are Science, Information and Communication Technology, Physical Education and Music and Art, with each area being catered for by high quality educators who specialise in their fields. All the above provide a high care, high performance and supportive environment that enables every student to flourish.

Each classroom is fitted with state-of-the-art interactive panels, and all have access to desktop computers, laptops and iPad. The school has full Wi-Fi access. The school grounds are covered in native trees with four separate garden areas where students plant, nurture, harvest and eventually eat the produce in carefully structured and prepared classes. We have developed our own nature scape playground - The Waugal Trail - focusing on Noongar language, culture, and knowledge through play.

Staff at Clarkson Primary School are committed to the development of the whole child and place students at the centre of all planning. Our school is supported by a school board, representative of the school and the wider community. The board plays a major governance role in the school embracing and supporting the student-centred approach on which the school bases its operations. Clarkson Primary School is also supported by an active Parents and Citizens Association and continues to develop initiatives that encourage the parent community to contribute to engage with the school.

The ongoing growth of Clarkson Primary School will be closely linked to a supportive and interactive partnership with our community. We believe it takes the support and cooperation of the entire school community to raise a child and are proud to say that Clarkson Primary School is a fine example of this.

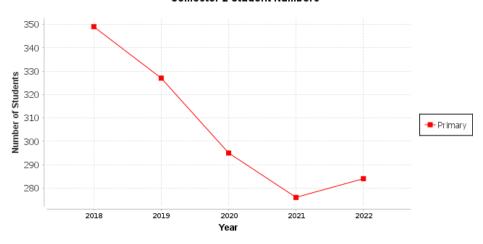

Our enrolments have continued to decline as the suburb demographics are changing. Many young families are moving to the newer suburbs to the north, where families can build affordable, brand-new homes.

There was an increase in enrolments once the Western Australian Government border restrictions were lifted. The following has been documented:

- School commenced 31 Jan 2022
- 31 enrolments from 1 Feb 1 Jul 22 (20 up to 31 Mar)
- 48 enrolments from 1 Feb 14 Dec 22
- 22 students leave during Semester 1
- 28 students leave during the year.

Of note, a local Catholic Primary school, and a WA Public Primary School in a nearby suburb, take a number of students from within the Clarkson PS local intake area.

A focus upon increasing positive relations with the community and subsequently, increase enrolments has occurred with School Leadership reaching out to local childcare centres, attending the playgroup run at the local church and hosting a stall at Ocean Keys Shopping centre, promoting the programs available at Clarkson PS.

2022 saw significant changes to School Leadership.

- The substantive Level 4 Associate Principal was seconded to another local Primary School for Semester One.
- The substantive Level 3 Associate Principal was seconded to a school in the Kimberley Education Region from the end of Term One for the remainder of 2022.
- A Level 3 Classroom Teacher from staff was placed into the Level 3 Associate Principal role for 2022, leaving a position available to employ a Graduate Teacher within the Early Childhood Area.
- The Principal, who had led the school for 9 years, was seconded to another Primary School from Semester Two, and subsequently became substantive after a Principal Selection process in Term Three.
- Principal Selection process for Clarkson PS was completed by NMERO, and a new substantive Principal was appointed at the end of Term Four.

COVID-19 had an impact of staffing as staff became unwell and relief staff were difficult to appoint.

A thorough Workforce Plan was developed by MCS with Gap Analysis and strategies, including identification of appropriate staff, allocation of funding for Professional Learning and succession planning for Specialist subject area expertise.

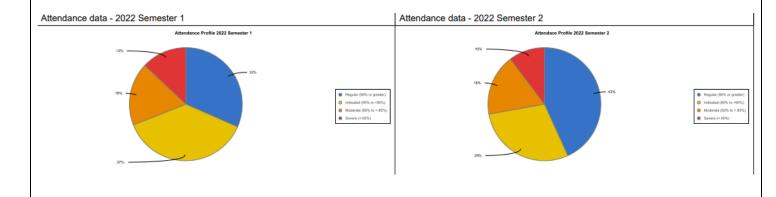

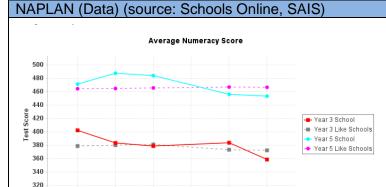
In 2022, attendance (81.5%) was lower than Like Schools (83.5%) and lower again from WA Public Schools (86.6%). Every WA School was affected by COVID-19 in 2022; this accounts for the significant decrease in attendance from 2021 and 2022. Clarkson PS also had a significant number of students with Severe Attendance (12.7%). With a focus upon attendance processes and engagement strategies, this reduced to 6.54% in Semester Two, 2022. School Leadership worked with these families, including a high proportion of Aboriginal students, to increase and support attendance and engagement.

In relation to managing students' attendance, Clarkson PS shared information with families via the newsletter and class Seesaw.

A targeted approach for monitoring Attendance will be the focus for 2023, with the development of CPS Attendance Policy and Guidelines, reflective of DOE Policy and procedures.

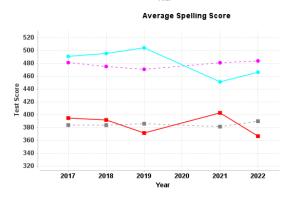

When interpreting NAPLAN Data, Clarkson Primary School uses data of 'Like Schools' to make judgements about performance.

Like schools are grouped according to a school's Index of

Socio-educational Advantage (ICSEA). Data for this index is drawn from many sources, principally census information. Clarkson PS's ICSEA in 2022 was 954 (8), the bracket representing the decile. Based on this, our Like Schools are:

Banksia Grove Primary School, Belmay Primary School, Boddington District High School, Cervantes Primary School, Cunderdin District High School, Dongara District High School, Donnybrook District High School, East Maddington Primary School, Embleton Primary School, Kingsley Primary School, Leeman Primary School, Manjimup Primary School, Millars Well Primary School, Mundijong Primary School, North Tom Price Primary School, Northam Primary School, Pinjarra Primary School, South Lake Primary School, Tambrey Primary School, Tom Price Primary School, Toodyay District high School and York District High School.



The 2022 NAPLAN results for Clarkson PS show students achieved at a lower rate in all assessments than like schools, often by a significant margin. The 2021- 2023 Business Plan target of 'All aspects of NAPLAN performance will be equal to or above Like Schools' has not been achieved.

There is no Comparative Performance data available for 2022.

Reasons for this downward trend, in addition to the ongoing demands faced by all schools due to COVID and attendance, may include a disrupted year in both the Year 3 and Year 5 cohorts due to changes in staff.

There was also significant student transiency (20%) in both cohorts assessed, with several new students coming to the school with challenging behaviours and low academic levels.

Where to from here?

Numeracy

- Introduce and support 'Prime Maths'
 as the whole of school maths
 program. This is expected to address
 the need to deliver a differentiated,
 structured maths program which
 integrates problem solving and
 concrete manipulatives in the delivery
 of the program.
- 2. Utilisation of data software, *Elastik*, to enable teachers to delve deeper into the data the school to clearly identify gaps and teach to those gaps.
- Continue whole school focus on the vocabulary of maths across the school and the use of Paul Swan activities.



Literacy

- 1. Consolidation of the use of Sounds Write as a means of explicit instructional practice in the area of phonics. This will be delivered with fidelity across the school and supported through collaborative practice and classroom observation.
- 2. Utilisation of data software, *Elastik*, to enable teachers to analyse data regularly and support gaps in student learning. This will be done in individual classes, within cohorts and across the school.
- 3. Support the consistent use of high impact lesson delivery through the ongoing implementation of the Clarkson PS Lesson Plan that includes an introduction/daily review, "I do, we do, you do" Gradual Release Model, opportunities for practice and application of skills and a plenary.
- 4. Monitoring of whole school writing data, with particular focus upon online writing assessment vs written writing assessment in order to identify and close gaps between Year 3 and Year 5, and between Clarkson PS students and 'Like Schools' students.

90% of Year 6 students enrolled in a WA public secondary school in 2022.

Of this cohort, 50% enrolled at Clarkson Community High School, the local in-take secondary school.



Parent/student/teacher satisfaction with the school

In 2022, The National School Survey was completed for Community and Staff. The **Community Survey** was distributed to families via Seesaw, newsletter and Facebook (both School and P&C). 7 responses were received. When presented to the School Board, it was agreed that there was not enough data for informed reflection and planning.

For increased participation in the future, it is planned that the survey "window" is extended and access to iPads is provided and monitored at school gates and whole school events, such as Assembly. With this, and the implementation of Connect, it is expected that greater take up will occur in 2023.

For the **Staff Survey**, 20 responses were completed. In relation to the strengths of Clarkson PS, staff commented on the supportive nature of their professional relationships and creating positive relationships with students and families. For example:

- "All members of staff are very supportive of each other, no matter what role they perform"
- "Programs are put in place to support teachers"
- "Having a supportive team to work with"
- "Positive interactions with students and parents at the gate each morning"
- "Supporting the whole child, helping families support their child's education"

With matters around areas for improvement, two major areas can be identified:

- Student Behaviour Management
- Communication

These are both acknowledged as areas of importance and staff have held many discussions around these areas since completing the survey. In 2023, the Department of Education will release a new Behaviour Management in Schools - Policy and Procedures. This will be utilised to address and refine behaviour management processes at Clarkson PS. The establishment of a Behaviour Team, to drive these changes will be implemented in Term One, 2023. To support Behaviour Management, 1.0FTE EA has been employed for support in the Senior School, Chaplaincy has increased to 0.6FTE and the employment of an AIEO at 0.8FTE, to accommodate the needs of our community. Communication as an area for improvement is also noted. Whole school Connect will be implemented in 2023. Staff reflection within the survey note that staff have felt that decisions have been made, without consultation or discussion with staff. Opportunities for whole staff reflection, review and input into decision making processes is a priority for 2023.

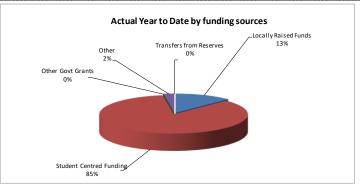


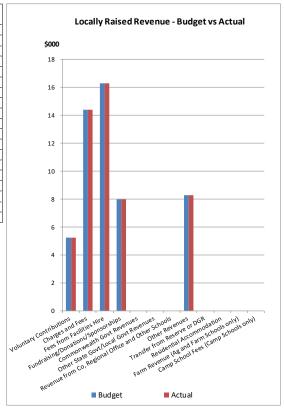
School Income by Funding Source

Clarkson Primary School Financial Summary as at

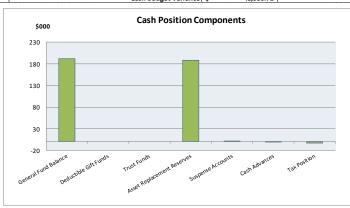

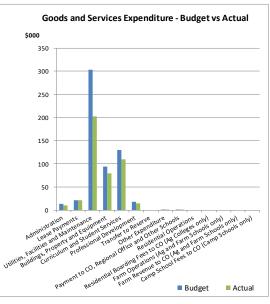
